Vessel Named at Request of Negroes To Honor Memory of a White Friend



A silver plaque, to be presented to the ship by Vick Chemical Company in honor of the man who founded "Vicks," Lunsford Richardson—industrialist, philanthropist, humanitarian—will memorialize the event. Its inscription reads:

"The S. S. Lunsford Richardson carries the distinction of being so named by the U. S. Maritime Commission at the special request of leading Negro citizens of North Carolina 'to honor the memory of a white friend.' While founding an industrial empire of his own, he found time always to be of service to his fellow man."

The S. S. Lunsford Richardson has just glided down the ways at Brunswick, Georgia, the 55th Liberty Ship to be launched by the J. A. Jones Construction Company at this yard. Sponsoring it was Mrs. Grace Richardson Stetson, granddaughter of the late Lunsford Richardson. Co-sponsor was Miss Mollie Richardson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lunsford Richardson II, who were present for the christening ceremonies. Also present for the event was Watson Law, 71-year-old Negro of Greensboro, N. C., who traveled down to Brunswick to witness this honor to the memory of his white friend, and to a man who had contributed significantly to the welfare of his race.
